Counseling cases for bilingual guidance concerns in different types of multicultural families



Children from multicultural families can be classified into children from international marriage families and children from foreign families. A child from an international marriage family refers to a child born to a Korean parent and his/her spouse; and a child from a foreign family refers to a child born to a family of foreign couple who moved to Korea before or after the birth of the child. Examine the counseling cases on the concerns about bilingual guidance from both types of families, and guide your children to realize that the range of careers they can choose as bilingual speakers is wider, and encourage them to work on their bilingual skills.

Concern in an international marriage family

The child refuses to learn the language of the foreign parent at home.

- Attract the child's interest by showing the parent reading books or talking on the phone in the native language!
- Start with listening to the parent's language and talking naturally in daily life!
- Show a more respectful attitude toward the culture and language of the parent's country, and create a natural atmosphere to have conversations!

Concern in a foreign family

The child only wants to use the native language,
so his/her Korean doesn't improve.

- Guide them to various opportunities (ex. Bilingual speech contest) to recognize that bilingualism can be their strengths to challenge themselves!
- Use different tools (games, animation, songs, etc.) suitable for your children's level for them to get more interested in Korean!
- Set and practice the rule to use Korean at school and their native language at home!

My story in two languages, National Bilingual Speech Contest

The Ministry of Education has been holding the Bilingual Speech Contest every year since 2013, to develop the bilingual abilities of multicultural students and to raise their self-esteem. Last year, 51 multicultural students who won the preliminary contests in the provincial and municipal education offices participated and gave presentations on various topics in Korean and their parents' mother tongue. This year, the national competition (The 9th National Bilingual Speech Contest) is scheduled to be held in early November. Participating students are awarded the Minister of Education Award or special awards through judgment, and given opportunities to participate in follow-up programs (The Multicultural School of Love with LG Language Course) so they can continue to develop their bilingual ability. So, please provide the opportunities for your children to develop talents and embrace the world by showing their abilities at the Bilingual Speech Contest!

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Danuri Helpline described by the Family Counseling Director of Danuri Helpline

Danuri Helpline provides information needed for daily living, plus various kinds of counseling on problems such as conflict between parents and children due to lack of communication, etc. In addition to calls, the counselee can also visit the center, or a counselor can visit families. However, due to the spread of COVID-19, the counseling is operated mainly through calls and online. Danuri Helpline provides interpretation and translation necessary for counseling to help multicultural families adjust to life in Korea, and provides counseling based on years of experience to resolve conflicts arising from cultural differences.

Case Studies to Learn about Our Children's Career Concerns

Let's think about how to talk to our children about their career paths based on the counseling cases of career concerns of youths from multicultural families.

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"What do you need to do to become a cook in Korea?"

Father: Korean; Mother: Chinese



I want to become a cook, but I don't know what to do to begin a cooking profession in Korea. It seems that everyone has a university degree to secure an occupation. Do you need to go to a university to become a cook?

There are some people who learn to cook in universities, but it is not required. You can find various routes to become the cook you want to be if you look at cooking careers in the <Information on career paths for 50 occupations> published by the Ministry of Education. There is also a test for a qualification as a craftsman cook in Korea. Why don't you start studying to prepare for the test for craftsman cook?



I see, it may be helpful to have a goal. However, my Korean isn't very good yet. Can I still take the written test?

The written test may not be easy, but if you keep studying for the license, your Korean will also get better naturally. I hope you don't give up easily.



I won't. Thank you.

Counseling TIP Check to see if there are restrictions on your child's dream career before guiding them. If there are any restrictions, have a conversation with your child to decide on how to deal with it!

"Can a multicultural student become a pilot?"

Father: Pakistani, Mother: Pakistani



I was raised in Pakistan and came to Korea 6 years ago. I look different from Koreans. I wonder if multicultural students can also become pilots, how much you need to study, and what school you need to go to.

To learn about basic information on career, you can use <Career Net>. If you search an occupation, you can see the details such as related qualifications, etc. However, you need to go to the military to become a pilot. The most widely known way to become a pilot is to finish the air force academy first, but you need to have Korean citizenship to enter the academy. Since you have Pakistani nationality, I think you first need to be naturalized as a Korean citizen.



I will have to talk to my parents about giving up my Pakistani nationality.

Counseling TIP Guide your children to find helpful materials about their career paths and shape it on their own. In addition, don't forget to encourage them to have confidence in themselves!
